Community Engagement



The pandemic brought many on-site community engagement programs to a halt. **GWWN** re-imagined strategies to fulfill our mission and vision. Here's what some of the activities included: (1) increased articles in our newsletters and community resource newscast to educate, inspire, and support organizations and readers, beyond our members, (2) **GWWN** performed research, provided resources, responded to inquiries, and provided assistance on various topics including how to host teleconferencing events, (3) Published other organizations events, (4) Sent appreciation letters to members and others.

Frontline workers and other essential workers experienced unbelievable challenges to keep the hospitals, groceries, transportation, and deliveries functioning: (5) **GWWN** facilitated an initiative to send a personal thank you poem card entitled *"Because You Care"* to hospital essential workers in the Washington, DC metropolitan area. Twenty-five cards were mailed, (6) **GWWN** members performed other acts of kindness such as pooled groceries and shopping errands, provided various items including food to small groups, (7) participated in the "Get Out to Vote" campaign, and (8) other caring tasks to express appreciation. Although these actions might seem small, they generated big bright smiles and joy.

Our accomplishments: (1) **GWWN** operated as an information resource powerhouse, (2) **GWWN** demonstrated how we cared and appreciated others, and (3) since we missed previous privileges before the pandemic, these actions made life sweeter!

Historic Achievements

National Women's Museum Defends for You to be Represented In Recognition of Women's History and Contributions to America and to Empower



On February 10, 2020, The House of Representatives voted on H.R. 1980, a bill that would establish a National Women's History Museum (NWHM) with the Smithsonian. Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-NY) answered the question "*Why*" for the museum. Watch the **YouTube video**.

She introduced H.R. 1980 on March 28, 2019, with Congressman Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA), Congresswoman Brenda Lawrence (D-MI), and Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC).

On December 1, 2017, Congresswoman Carolyn B. Maloney, hosted a luncheon with women organization leaders to share the vision for the new NWHM. **GWWN**'s Marilyn Dawson, Business Advisory Chair, attended the meeting on behalf of Mary Greene, **GWWN** Executive Director and **GWWN**.

Toastmaster, Advanced Communicator Bronze (ACB) Award GWWN, Director of Membership and Secretary



Ms. Cheryl Blount was awarded Toastmaster, Advanced Communicator Bronze (ACB) June 2020. The ACB award requires the completion of two advanced manuals, and the Competent Communicator manual. Ms. Blount also possesses the "Competent Communicator" and "Competent Leader" awards.

Her journey in Toastmasters International began in November 2012. She became a member of Wheaton Community Toastmasters Club (Silver Spring, MD), and has held several officer positions – President, Vice President of Education, Vice President of Membership, Secretary, and Sargent-At-Arms.

Ms. Blount is currently Vice President of Education at Wheaton Community Toastmasters Club. She is continuing her journey in the Toastmasters Pathways Leadership Development program to help practice and improve her speaking, communication, and leadership skills.

She credits her volunteer experience with **GWWN** as the springboard to her development and growth of leadership skills. She became a dedicated **GWWN** volunteer in 2001, and was involved in event planning, and strategic planning when she was asked to be a member of **GWWN** Board of Directors. As a result, Ms. Blount's leadership skills were instrumental in her receiving several job promotions in her career.

Women: Breaking Barriers

Six women ran for the presidency in 2020, more than any in the U.S. History.

A total of six women from the Democratic Party were in the race for president — Tulsi Gabbard, Elizabeth Warren, Amy Klobuchar, Marianne Williamson, Kamala Harris, and Kirsten Gillibrand. **These barrier breakers are achievements for all women!**

On Tuesday, August 11, 2020, Kamala Harris (Senator and 2020) presidential candidate from California (2017–present) was named by Joe Biden as his VP pick, choosing his former Democratic primary opponent. There are many barrier-breaking moments if elected - she will be the nation's first female, first student from Howard University, an Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), first Black and first Asian American Vice President. Also, Joe Biden, 77 will be the oldest President to be elected.

Harris said: I'm honored to join him as our party's nominee for Vice President and do what it takes to make him our Commander-in-Chief." Harris brings energy and charisma to Biden's campaign along with her qualifications and expertise.



Biden said: "I need someone working alongside me who is smart, tough, and ready to lead. Kamala is that person," he wrote. "I need someone who understands the pain that so many people in our nation are suffering. Whether they've lost their job, their business, or a loved one to this virus."

GWWN: We have empowered women and men for 25 years. When one person succeeds another one succeeds. This means the impact **GWWN** made on their lives were transferred to others. It is still being transferred to more people because it is a domino effect. This is a very important achievement.

Interviewer: Where was GWWN's first networking event hosted?

GWWN: In 1995 when **GWWN** was established, our first networking event was hosted at the historic Mayflower Hotel, Washington, DC. Many events were hosted there.

Interviewer: You facilitated your regular monthly events at other venues, right?

GWWN: Yes, many businesses sponsored nonprofit organizations by providing meeting facilities.

Interviewer: Really- Pro Bono?

GWWN: Yes. The Adams National Bank, now the Premier Bank, and Robert Half International and Office Teams sponsored space for **GWWN** many years until they downsized.

Interviewer: What are some challenges and lesson-learned?

GWWN: Although you might be a visionary, there will always be challenges. The key is work your passion and motivate your faith. Encourage and help others to identify their talents and appreciate them. Always do your absolute best and don't be afraid to ask for help. Things will work out on your behalf. Be grateful!

GWWN: This year's highlight *Inside An Amazing Look...Treasures* acclaims **GWWN's** 25th year anniversary legacy.


